FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

At first glance, this week's gospel reads like a straightforward account of one of Jesus' many miracles – that of changing water into wine. Jesus, his mother, and some of His disciples, attend a wedding in Cana. As was the custom, the wedding feast was held over a period of several days. On the third day, the wine ran out. Mary mentions it to Jesus and after some seeming hesitation, He changes water into the best wine the wedding guests have ever had. Jesus saves the wedding! In Our Lord's day, it was considered a huge breach in etiquette to run out of wine during a wedding banquet. As in many Bible stories, there is a lot more going on here than meets the eye.

Many parallels can be drawn between the wedding in Cana and the new covenant that Christ will soon make with God's people. A covenant is a contract or agreement between two or more parties, as in a marriage. Jesus' initial response on hearing that there is no more wine is, "...My hour has not yet come." (John 2:5) This is the most obvious hint that this gospel reading isn't just about a wedding but about Christ's destiny in the world. The wine runs out on the third day; Jesus' resurrection happens on the third day after His death. In John's gospel, the greatest miracle isn't the water turned to the most excellent wine but the salvation, abundance and new life now present in the world through Jesus. Christ doesn't just save the wedding, He saves the entire world.



Thank you so much for your financial support and for living your financial commitment to your parish. We are grateful for those who generously support the parish. **We need your support** to achieve our weekly collection goal of \$6,000 per Sunday which is essential to the financial health of your parish.

For the weekend of January 10, 363 people attended Mass. The collection in church amounted to \$3,799. ParishPay donations for the past week were \$2,218, contributing to a weekend collection of \$6,017. This is \$17 above our weekly goal of \$6,000.

If you have been away from church traveling for any reason, we encourage you to "make up" your contributions.

OLC is starting to face a financial crisis. This past year many families have relocated out of Jersey City. This has adversely effected our Sunday collections. Collections are down and ParishPay contributions have dropped by 30% to less than \$1,900 per week. ARCHDIOCESAN PRIESTS RETIREMENT COLLECTION



WE ARE LIVING STONES CAPITAL CAMPAIGN



The ***We Are Living Stones Capital Campaign*** will provide the solid foundation upon which our Church will continue to build and enhance the future for all one million Catholics across Northern New

Jersey. Financial resources are essential to enable our parishes to continue supporting the journey of faith, spirituality and ministry of our expanding Catholic community. The goal is to raise more than \$90 million in pledges to support six priorities: *Parish Share, Tuition Assistance Endowment, Works of Mercy, Parish Renewal Fund, Seminarian Support Endowment, and Retired Priest Care and Medical Needs Endowment.*

Parish Share: The physical needs of our parishes now and into the future are of great concern. It is projected that the parishes of the Archdiocese will need almost \$125 million over the next ten years to ensure that the 1,100 church, school and rectory buildings, parish centers, ministry offices and other buildings within the Archdiocese where we engage in the work of the Church are kept in good condition. Once a parish reaches its "Parish Share" target, then 50% of all funds raised return back to the parish while simultaneously funding additional case elements that both directly and indirectly benefit our parishes.

Tuition Assistance Endowment: The Catholic Schools of the Archdiocese of Newark are faith-filled learning communities of parents, students, teachers, and administrators who foster the development of our children spiritually, morally and intellectually. Our students love, learn, and live their faith in service to others. One of the objectives of this campaign will be to establish a Tuition Assistance Endowment Fund of \$18 million that will increase our ability to help more students attend our elementary schools. The earnings from this fund will be available to help defray the costs of tuition for financially deserving children. Through an application process that will include a need-based assessment, certification of good standing at the parish, and acceptance to the school, students will be able to apply for tuition assistance through their pastor. We must ensure that our schools are open to Catholic families of any income level so all have an opportunity for a Christ-centered educational experience.

Works of Mercy: As Christians, we are called to love our brothers and sisters in Christ by sharing the blessings entrusted to each one of us, trusting that the Lord will provide for our needs. We can do this by giving alms and contributing to programs, organizations and ministries committed to the spiritual and corporal "Works of Mercy" and thereby supporting the evangelical mission of the Church. For the duration of the ***We Are Living Stones Capital Campaign***, parishes will

contribute the first share of their revenue to help instruct, advise, console, comfort and support those in need, both physically and spiritually.

Parish Renewal Fund: While we work to strengthen our parish infrastructure, we must simultaneously provide opportunities for our parish leaders to spread the Gospel message and serve the people of our great Archdiocese. Evangelizing and educating our people in our rapidly-changing world will require creative programs and initiatives that address our modern realities and challenges. This new Parish Renewal fund will provide grants to parishes to aid in their evangelization and religious education efforts.

Seminarian Support Endowment: Central to our lives as Catholics is the sacramental life of the Church. Our Priests pastor our parishes and encourage us on the journey of faith. The Church of Newark is committed to providing the necessary resources for our future Priests. The three seminaries operated by the Archdiocese of Newark continue to attract men answering the call to dedicate their lives to the Church. In this campaign, the Archdiocese would like to add \$8 million to the current endowment of \$14 million to provide for the formation and education of seminarians preparing to serve in the Archdiocese of Newark. The grants will enable our Priests and laity to get the continuing education and training that today's Church requires. It will also provide funding for evangelization and religious education programs.

Retired Priest Care and Medical Needs Endowment: Presently, there are nearly 200 retired Priests of the Archdiocese. These men have selflessly offered decades of service to the faithful. As our Priests age and retire, they often experience ongoing challenges that require our continuing care and attention. The goal through ***We Are Living Stones*** is to add \$6 million to the existing restricted endowment fund of \$14.35 million to assist with the mounting healthcare costs of our aged and retired Priests. With the growing number of retired clergy in our Archdiocese, we can anticipate that the number of priests who will have to rely in part on this fund will continue to increase.
