FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Many people make resolutions on how they hope to achieve a "happy new year". "To make "Happy New Year" a reality instead of just a pleasantry, there is scientific research that can point anyone in the direction of a happier life."

"Some of the tips are common sense – getting enough sleep, exercise and outdoor time, and making time to help others. But psychology professor, Tim Bono, at Washington University in St. Louis says people who take just a few minutes a week to acknowledge the good in their lives and the things they're grateful for, tend to see significant increases in their happiness. 'It's also one of the easiest behaviors for us to incorporate into our daily lives,' he points out. 'And it really doesn't even involve changing anything about our lives – rather, it's taking just a few minutes to shift the focus of our attention to those things that are going well for us.' Bono studies happiness and teaches about the science behind it. He says New Year's resolutions work best when they are aimed at incorporating healthy, long-term habits into your life - and research shows that adding gratitude is one of the most effective... Everyone has the ability to change their thinking, but it takes some willpower...which can be learned by practicing on little things. For instance, he says, try not to check your phone or email constantly. 'If you can exercise strong willpower in those small behaviors, eventually that will accumulate to giving you the willpower to carry out the larger goals you have,' Bono explains. People who blame their upbringing for being pessimists aren't seeing the whole picture. 'About half of the variance in our overall psychological health and happiness is due to genetics...,"'he states. 'But there's also a significant part that is due to things like our circumstances, and the intentional behaviors that we incorporate into our lives on a regular basis.' One of the major barriers to happiness is the tendency to size up how your life measures up to others. Bono suggests limiting time on social media and connecting more often with good, face-to-face conversation."

We need to recognize that there is also a spiritual demention in achieving happiness in the coming year. A person of faith recognizes that all good things in life find their origins in a loving God. Yes, it is important to recognize them as God's gift, not necessarily because we think we worked for them, but because God bestowed them upon us. There is a path to holiness here that often eludes us, because we frequently find ourselves fixated on our possessions, even if we appreciate them. If we were to take Bono's suggestions one step deeper, true happiness is found in doing the will of the Father. We are challenged to give up the many distractions and possessions we have that distract us fron God's Will..

WEEKLY OFFERING



Thank you so much for your financial support and for financial living your commitment to your parish. We are grateful for those who generously support We need your parish. support to achieve our weekly collection goal of

\$6,000 per Sunday which is essential to the financial health of your parish.

OLC is facing a financial crisis. This past year many families have relocated out of Jersey City. This has adversely affected our Sunday collections. Collections are down and ParishPay contributions have dropped by 30% to an average of less than \$1,900 per week. A very important way in which you can support your parish is to enroll in ParishPay and by being more generous in the Sunday collection. To sign up, go to www.parishpay.com and follow the prompts.

For the weekend of December 24/25, 526 people attended Mass. The Christmas collection in church amounted to \$38,256. The ParishPay donations were \$5,011, contributing to a Christmas collection of \$43,267.

For the weekend of December 31/January 1, 326 The collection in church people attended Mass. amounted to \$4,414. ParishPay donations for the past week were \$2,439, contributing to a weekend collection of \$6,853. This is \$853 above our weekly goal of

Additional Christmas donations this past week amounted to \$7,050, bringing our total Christmas collection thus far to 50,317.

If you have been away from church traveling for any reason, we encourage you to "make up" your contributions. Remember that although it is important to support your parish financially, your donation is ultimately a gift back to God for his blessings.

WE ARE LIVING STONES

The Living Stones Campaign continues. Pledge envelopes may be found in the rear of the church. Because pledges have exceeded our Works of Mercy Goal, the parish will start receiving a rebate of 50% once parishioners have fulfilled their pledges. We are already almost half-way there - half of all actual contributions over our goal will help us with capital improvements.

CHRISTMAS GIFT APPEAL



A few weekends ago, a member of our Parish Finance Committee spoke at Mass about Our Annual Christmas Gift Appeal. This is a parish tradition dating back 20 years.

For those of you who may not know about this, we make a special appeal at Christmas to raise additional money for physical improvements to our church. Today, we take

for granted many of these improvements that generous parishioners made possible through their donations. The handicap ramp is new, as is the bathroom in the church narthex. Thanks to your generosity in the Christmas Appeal, we were able to purchase a new organ and a piano, made repairs to the stained glass windows and the list goes on.

This year the Gift Appeal takes on greater significance. Over the last fiscal year, many very supportive parishioners have relocated out of the parish. Consequently, our Sunday revenues dropped \$54,000 this past year. If you have followed the bulletin, you have read each week how our Sunday collections have not reached our weekly goal of \$6,000.

This year's annual Christmas Gift is a very important part of our commitment to the financial well-being of our parish. Without it, we will struggle to make improvements to the church.

We have two goals this year. The first is to make up the \$54,000 revenue shortfall from last year. The second is to raise additional moneys for a reserve to make other necessary improvements to the church. Therefore, we need to raise more than \$80,000 this Christmas.

This is ambitious but very possible. To date about 17% of our registered parishioners donated to the Christmas Gift Appeal. Their donations amounted to \$50,00. That is very impressive and I thank those who contributed so generously.

In our Appeal, we urged everyone to contribute, donating what ever you could afford. Our practice has been to ask every family to donate \$400 to the Christmas Gift. For those parishioners who earn six figures or more, or even in the high 5-figure range, we asked that you consider making a more generous contribution. For those who may be on a fixed income, we simply ask that you give what you can afford. You may also contribute using Parish Pay. Simply go online and adjust your contribution accordingly.

We appreciate your past generosity and urge you to donate if you haven't. Thank you.
